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PURPOSE/BACKGROUND

After the U.S. Department of Education made changes to school accountability requirements during the COVID-19 pandemic, the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) will resume its work around the Washington School Improvement Framework (WSIF) in March 2023. Washington's Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) <u>Consolidated Plan</u> has some temporary adjustments due to COVID-19-related data collection limitations. These are outlined in the state's ESSA addendum.

This bulletin is intended to provide some information about the accountability framework and the upcoming identification cycle that starts in 2023 and continues to 2025. Accountability data will be posted to the Washington State Report Card in early March 2023. District leaders with identified schools will be contacted by OSPI staff prior to public release.

What is WSIF?

The <u>Washington School Improvement Framework</u>, commonly referred to as WSIF, is the state's federally required accountability system.

Briefly, the WSIF is an accountability system designed to identify schools for additional state supports to serve their students. See table 1 for more detail on supports.

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Reporting and Timeline

Mid-January 2023: Preliminary WSIF data file made available to school districts for review.

Late January 2023: Last date for districts to update CEDARS data from 2021–22, which will affect several of the measures.

Mid-February 2023: Districts will be able to preview their final WSIF data. The "threshold" level or score for support will not be announced until the public data release.

Late February 2023: OSPI will notify superintendents of their district's schools that have been identified for support.

Early March 2023: WSIF data will be publicly available on Washington's Report Card.

Mid-March 2023: Identified schools will receive a message about the levels of support available to them.

Early May 2023: Education Grants Management System will be opened for schools to complete grant-related applications.

Mid-June 2023: School Improvement Plans for Tier 3 schools will be due to the Office of System and School Improvement.

How is a School Identified?

Schools are measured using multiple indictors. The WSIF indicators used in Washington's ESSA Consolidated Plan are guided by the federal government and include academic proficiency, graduation rate, English language proficiency, and school quality and student success (comprised of three measures: regular attendance, ninth grade on track, and dual credit).

Each indicator is mapped to a 1 to 10 score, and they are combined into an overall score. WSIF is calculated not only for schools as a whole (for all students combined), but also for the following individual student groups: race/ethnicity, low-income status, students with disabilities, and English learners.

Based on the WSIF combined score for the "All Students" student group, OSPI will identify a threshold level to identify the lowest performing five percent of schools. See table 1 for more detail on identification.

What Happens if a School is Identified?

A school that is identified for Tier 3 or Tier 3+ Supports will be offered supports from the Office of System and School Improvement (OSSI). Available supports include both state and federal funds, school improvement funds, a Continuous Improvement Partner (CIP) who works with district and school leadership to improve education systems, and access to a network of support focused on continuous improvement. Tier 3 and Tier 3+ schools will have to submit their School Improvement Plans (SIPs) to OSSI for twice-a-year progress monitoring. A school that is identified for Tier 2 Supports will have access to a network of support focused on continuous improvement and, if funds are available, school improvement funds. Tier 2 Support schools will have to submit a SIP to their school district not OSSI.

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All available supports are recommended but optional, and no school is required to accept OSSI funds, work with a CIP, or access the network of support.
