


The Mexican-American Commission was created as result of the civil and labor rights movement of the late 1960's.





Barriers To Mental Health Care

This inequality puts these communities at a higher risk for more severe and persistent forms of mental health conditions, because without treatment, mental health conditions often worsen.


<u>35.1%</u> of Hispanic/Latinx adults with mental illness receive treatment each year compared to the U.S. average of <u>46.2%</u>. This is due to many unique barriers to care.





Behavioral Health- Hispanics

- In 2019, suicide was the second leading cause of death for Hispanics, ages 15 to 34
- Suicide attempts for Hispanic girls, grades 9-12, were 30 percent higher than for non-Hispanic white girls in the same age group, in 2019.
- In 2018, Hispanics were 50 percent less likely to have received mental health treatment as compared to non-Hispanic whites.
- Poverty level affects mental health status. Hispanics living below the poverty level, as compared to Hispanics over twice the poverty level, are twice as likely to report serious psychological distress.


 Researchers found that 13% of Latino participants surveyed met the criteria for "depression likely" and 16

• Scores were higher for those aged 18–30 or over 65 or were women, divorced or with higher education but lower incomes.

• The state ranks 37th among the 50 states plus the District of Columbia for a higher prevalence of mental illness and

• In King County, for example, the ratio of mental health providers to the general population is 1 to 220; in Douglas

RATES OF YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH PROBLEMS ARE AT HISTORICALLY HIGH RATES (AND RISING)

There has been a 33% increase in the rate of students reporting depression and anxiety since 2010

The COVID-19 pandemic exacerbated stressors for youth.




Washington's Healthy Youth Survey data show 1 in 10 students in 8th, 10th and 12th grades attempted suicide in

UW - 2023 POLICY AND FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS

- Eliminate Isolation and Reduce use of restraint


