BIDDER ELIGIBILITY: This Informal Solicitation is open to those Bidders that satisfy the minimum qualifications stated herein and that are available for work in Washington State.

The Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) is the agency of the State of Washington that is issuing this solicitation on behalf of the Commission. In coordination with the Commission, OSPI will serve as the Coordinator for this solicitation. All communications concerning this Informal Solicitation must be directed only to the Informal Solicitation Coordinator via email. Any other communication will be considered unofficial and non-binding on the Commission/OSPI. Bidders are to rely on written statements issued by the Informal Solicitation Coordinator. Communication directed to parties other than the Informal Solicitation Coordinator may result in disqualification of the Bidder.

INTRODUCTION

The Washington State Charter School Commission (Commission) is issuing this solicitation to solicit information and interest for qualified individuals to assist with the Commission's annual monitoring process. Specifically, selected individuals will serve as Site Visit Consultants who will be contracted to conduct reviews and draft reports for first year site visits of operating schools.

Site visits serve as a tool to inform continuous improvement for the Washington State Charter School Commission (Commission) and authorized charter schools. Site visits also serve to provide data points in determining a charter school's compliance with the *Organizational Performance Framework*. Site visits are conducted for charter schools in their first year of operation. Through this solicitation, the Commission aims to find qualified consultants to evaluate the organizational performance of charter schools in their first year of operation.

A team of two (2) consultants will review each charter school in their first year of operation. A sample 2018-2019 Site Visit Timeline is incorporated as Exhibit C. The teams will be led by Commission staff and include consultants with diverse expertise in the areas of student achievement/performance, school climate, operations, governance, finance, and charter schools. The Commission is committed to having individuals with an understanding of the Washington State education context represented on the evaluation teams.

The Commission's goal is to select between two (2) and four (4) Washington-based consultants with experience in school finance, academics, administration, governance, operations, culturally relevant education, and/or charter school oversight.

All responses to this solicitation will be evaluated by the Commission's staff. The Commission may enter into contract(s) with one or more consultant as a result of this solicitation.

SCOPE OF WORK

Consultants selected through this solicitation will be expected to, at a minimum:

1. Attend an online site visit orientation session/Webinar which will be approximately four (4) hours in length. This webinar is tentatively scheduled for late April 2019.
2. Evaluate and provide written comments, and draft site visit reports for charter schools visited. All consultants are expected to review and draft site visit reports within the given review time period (approximately four (4) weeks after conducting the site visit); average time is approximately eight (8) hours per site visit report.
3. Participate in one (1) to two (2) school debriefing calls prior to the site visit (approximately two (2) hours per charter school).
4. Participate in one (1) review of supporting documentation prior to the visit (approximately two (2) hours per charter school).
5. Participate, in the on-site school Site Visit (approximately sixteen (16) hours over two (2) days per school) for each first-year charter school. Site visits for the 2018-19 school year will take place in Tukwila, WA and Walla Walla, WA.
6. Participate in one (1) check-in with rough draft (approximately two (2) weeks post-site visit for one (1) hour in length).
7. All site visit consultants must complete site visit reviews using the site visit protocols and evaluation forms provided by the Commission as part of this process.

PERIOD OF PERFORMANCE

The period of performance of any contract awarded as a result of this solicitation is tentatively scheduled to begin on or about April 25, 2019, and end on or about July 3, 2019. The option to extend any contract resulting from this solicitation shall be at the sole discretion of the Commission.

As such, the Commission reserves the right to amend to extend the contract for three (3) additional contract years through 2022. Decision to amend shall be based on sustained satisfactory performance as decided by the Superintendent's designee, successful completion of project objectives, and availability of funding.

BUDGET

Applicants shall not submit a cost proposal in response to this solicitation. The Commission will reimburse contractors four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500) per site visit and report.

Any applicable mileage, meals, lodging, or other travel-related expenses, will be reimbursed in accordance with [Washington State travel regulations](#) established by the Office of Financial Management.

If the Commission determines it is necessary to increase the Contractor's involvement, the Commission may amend any awarded contract to increase the Contractor's involvement. Such amendment, if any, to increase or decrease the dollar value and extend the period of performance, shall be at the sole discretion of the Commission.

MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS

This solicitation is open to individuals that meet the following minimum criteria:

1. Licensed to do business in the State of Washington. If not licensed, provide a written intent to become licensed in Washington within thirty (30) calendar days of being selected as the Apparent Successful Bidder. 2. Knowledge and experience in school finance, educational programs, student achievement, culturally responsive education systems/school climate, board governance, school operations, special populations, and/or charter school oversight.
3. Knowledge and experience with school oversight and reporting for compliance and accountability.
4. Knowledge with Washington State educational context.

Bidders who do not meet these minimum qualifications shall be deemed to be non-responsive, will not be evaluated, and a score will not be assigned.

SCHEDULE

This solicitation will remain open until filled. However, applicants interested in this opportunity are encouraged to submit required documents for the initial round of review no later than 5:00 p.m. PST on April 5, 2019 to for an initial round of reviews. Applications received after this date will be reviewed upon receipt.

The Commission/OSPI has the right to change this schedule as necessary.

PROPOSAL CONTENTS

All prospective Site Visit Consultants must address **all** questions in Exhibit A – **Site Visit Consultant Qualifications**. As part of the response, all interested individuals must also submit a resume or CV and references.

All prospective Site Visit Consultants must also the Certificate and Assurances – See Exhibit B and must provide business information on the Contractor Intake Form – See Exhibit C.

The submission of qualifications in response to this solicitation does not guarantee selection as a Site Visit Consultant, even if the consultant satisfies all of the criteria set out below. Selection will depend upon the following:

1. The consultant’s qualifications and the unique needs of each specific site visit team as described above.
2. A phone interview with Commission staff (approximately 30 minutes)
3. Once selected, all prospective contractors will be required to review site visit materials, complete and submit a Conflict of Interest Questionnaire and Contractor Confidentiality Agreement. Contractors determined to have any conflict of interest, whether real or perceived, are ineligible to serve in this review process.

Proposals will be evaluated by the Commission based on the response to the information requested above. All items above must be addressed for the proposal to be considered responsive.

All proposals shall be submitted electronically via email to the Informal Solicitation Coordinator noted below. Attachments to email shall be on Microsoft Office software and/or PDF format. The Commission/OSPI does not assume responsibility for any problems in the email submission or delays caused by any delivery service. PHONE INTERVIEW

The Commission, at its sole discretion, may elect to select the top scoring finalists from the written evaluation for a phone interview and final determination of contract award. Should the Commission elect to hold a phone interview, it will contact the top-scoring bidders to schedule a time on **April 11-12, 2019**. Commitments made by the Bidder at the oral interview, if any, will be considered binding. The scores from the written evaluation and the oral presentation combined together will determine the Apparent Successful Bidder.

The Commission/OSPI reserves the right at its sole discretion to reject any or all proposals for any reason whatsoever prior to the execution of a contract. This solicitation does not obligate the Commission/OSPI to contract for the services specified herein. The final selection, if any, will be the proposal, which in the opinion of the Commission/OSPI best meets the requirements set forth in this solicitation, and is in the best interest of the State of Washington. OSPI is not obligated to select the lowest priced proposal. The Commission/OSPI shall not be responsible for any costs associated with a Bidder's preparation of a proposal in response to this solicitation. The Commission/OSPI reserves the right, at its sole discretion, to waive minor administrative irregularities.

The Contractor selected to perform the duties as outlined in this solicitation shall be required to sign a contract, including General Terms and Conditions. Bidders shall not propose their own standard contract or terms and conditions in response to this solicitation.

AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT

OSPI complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Bidders may contact the Informal Solicitation Coordinator to receive this Solicitation in an alternative format.

COMMITMENT OF FUNDS

Only authorized representatives of the Commission/OSPI may legally commit the Commission/OSPI to the expenditures of funds for a contract resulting from this Informal Solicitation. No cost chargeable to the proposed contract may be incurred before receipt of a fully executed contract.

PROPRIETARY INFORMATION/PUBLIC DISCLOSURE

Your entire response to this Informal Solicitation is a public record and will be disclosed consistent with the Public Records Act, Chapter 42.56 RCW.

A. CONFIDENTIAL DOCUMENTS

For the purposes of this Informal Solicitation, do not include confidential or proprietary information unless specifically requested by OSPI.

If OSPI requests confidential or proprietary information, you must clearly print the word "Confidential" on the lower right-hand corner of each page containing the confidential or proprietary information.

B. PUBLIC RECORDS REQUESTS

If a public records request seeks your proposal and the proposal contains pages clearly marked "Confidential", OSPI will take the following steps:

- i. We will notify you. We will identify the requestor and the date that OSPI will disclose the requested records.
- ii. We will give you an opportunity to seek a court order to stop OSPI from disclosing the records.
- iii. We will not evaluate or defend your claim of confidentiality. We will not withhold or redact your documents without a court order.

STATEWIDE VENDOR PAYMENT REGISTRATION

Vendors awarded contracts as a result of this solicitation are **required** to register as a Statewide Vendor (SWV). However, no preference will be included in the evaluation of proposals, no minimum level of MWBE participation shall be required as a condition for receiving an award, and proposals will not be rejected or considered non-responsive on that basis. Any affirmative action requirements set forth in federal regulations or statutes included or referenced in the contract documents will apply.

Self-Certification should be submitted with the Contractor Intake Form.

COMPLAINT PROCEDURE

The complaint process is available to Bidders interested in this solicitation. The complaint process allows Bidders to focus on the solicitation requirements and evaluation process and raise issues with these processes early enough in the process to allow Commission/OSPI to correct a problem before proposals are submitted and time expended on evaluations.

A Bidder may submit a complaint based on any of the following:

- The solicitation unnecessarily restricts competition;
- The solicitation evaluation or scoring process is unfair or flawed; or
- The solicitation requirements are inadequate or insufficient to prepare a response.

Bidders may submit complaints up to five (5) business days prior to the proposal due date noted in the Estimated Schedule of Procurement Activities. However, Bidders are encouraged to submit complaints as soon as possible so Commission/OSPI can rectify the issue(s) early in the process. Complaints must be submitted to the Informal Solicitation Coordinator. In order to be considered a valid complaint, the complaint must meet the following requirements:

- Must be in writing.
- Should clearly articulate the basis for the complaint.
- Should include a proposed remedy.

Complaints not received by the deadline noted in the Estimated Schedule of Procurement Activities will not be reviewed by Commission/OSPI. Failure by the bidder to raise a complaint at this stage may waive its right for later consideration.

The OSPI Contracts Administrator or an employee delegated by the Contracts Administrator will review valid complaints and respond to the submitter in writing. The Commission/OSPI will consider all complaints but is not required to adopt a complaint, in part or in full. The Commission/OSPI's response to the complaint is final and not subject to administrative appeal. The response, and any changes to the Informal Solicitation will be posted to WEBS prior to the proposal due date. Any complaint addressed during the complaint process cannot be raised during the protest process.

DEBRIEFING OF UNSUCCESSFUL PROPOSERS

Upon request, an individual debriefing conference will be scheduled with an unsuccessful Bidder. The request for a debriefing conference must be received by the Coordinator within three (3) business days after the Notification of Unsuccessful Bidder letter or e-mail is sent to the Bidder. The debriefing must be held within three (3) business days of the request, unless otherwise agreed upon by the Informal Solicitation Coordinator and Bidder.

Discussion will be limited to a critique of the requesting Bidder's proposal. Comparisons between proposals or evaluations of the other proposals will not be allowed. Debriefing

conferences may be conducted in person or on the telephone and will be scheduled for a maximum of thirty (30) minutes.

PROTEST PROCEDURE

This protest procedure is available to Bidders who submitted a response to this solicitation document and who have participated in a debriefing conference. Upon completion of the debriefing conference, the Bidder is allowed five (5) business days to file a protest of the acquisition with the Informal Solicitation Coordinator. Protests may be submitted by fax or email, but should be followed by a hard copy document.

Bidders protesting this procurement shall follow the procedures described below. Protests that do not follow these procedures shall not be considered. This protest procedure constitutes the sole administrative remedy available to Bidders under this procurement.

All protests must be in writing and signed by the protesting party or an authorized Agent. The protest must state the grounds for the protest including specific facts and complete statements of the action(s) being protested. The protesting party may submit with the protest any documents or information deemed relevant. A description of the relief or corrective action being requested should also be included. All protests shall be addressed to the Informal Solicitation Coordinator.

Only protests stipulating an issue of fact concerning the following subjects shall be considered:

- A matter of bias, discrimination or conflict of interest on the part of the evaluator/evaluation team;
- Errors in computing the score; and/or
- Non-compliance with procedures described in the procurement document or OSPI policy.

Protests not based on procedural matters will not be considered. Protests will be rejected as without merit if they address issues such as: 1) an evaluator's professional judgment on the quality of a proposal, 2) Commission/OSPI's assessment of its own and/or other agencies needs or requirements, or 3) a complaint raised during the Complaint Procedure.

Upon receipt of a protest, a protest review will be held by Commission/OSPI. OSPI's Contracts Administrator or an employee delegated by the Contracts Administrator who was not involved in the procurement will consider the record and all available facts and issue a decision within ten (10) business days of receipt of the protest. If additional time is required, the protesting party will be notified.

In the event a protest may affect the interest of another Bidder that submitted a proposal, such Bidder will be given an opportunity to submit its views and any relevant information on the protest to the Informal Solicitation Coordinator.

The final determination of the protest shall:

- Find the protest lacking in merit and uphold Commission/OSPI's action; or
- Find only technical or harmless errors in OSPI's acquisition process and determine OSPI to be in substantial compliance and reject the protest; or
- Find merit in the protest and provide Commission/OSPI options which may include:
 - Correct the errors and re-evaluate all proposals, and/or
 - Reissue the solicitation and begin a new process, or

- Make other findings and determine other courses of action as appropriate.

If Commission/OSPI determines that the protest is without merit, Commission/OSPI will enter into a contract with the Apparent Successful Bidder. If the protest is determined to have merit, one of the alternatives noted in the preceding paragraph will be taken.
