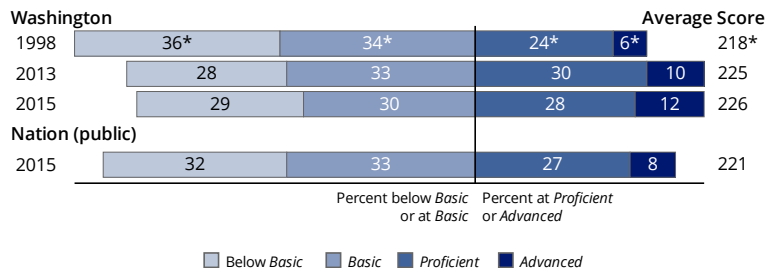


## Overall Results

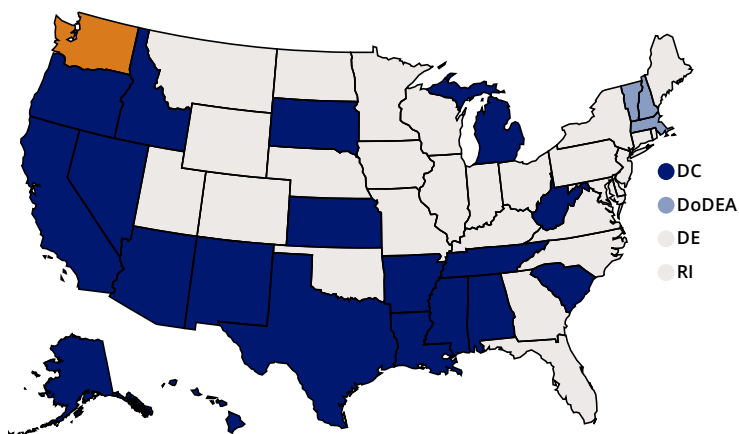
- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Washington was 226. This was higher than the average score of 221 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Washington in 2015 (226) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (225) and was higher than their average score in 1998 (218).
- The percentage of students in Washington who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 40 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (40 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (30 percent).
- The percentage of students in Washington who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 71 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (72 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (64 percent).

## Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in Washington (226) was

- lower than those in 4 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 20 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 27 states/jurisdictions

DoDEA = Department of Defense Education Activity (overseas and domestic schools)

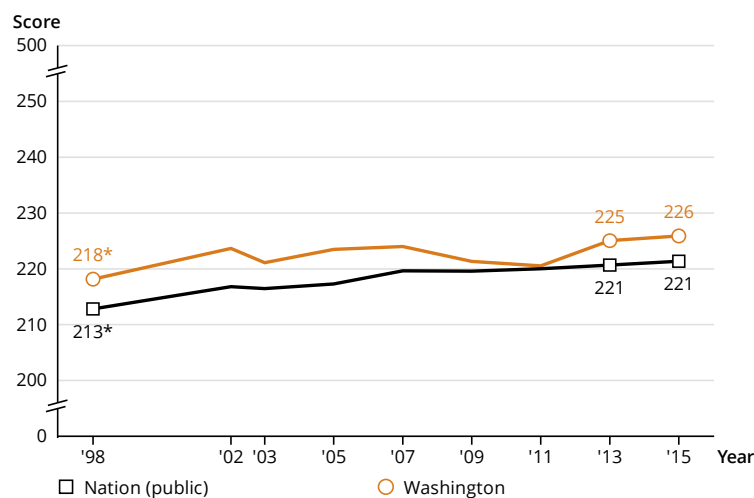

## Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 19 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (17 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 31 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (22 points).
- In 2015, female students in Washington had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 13 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 31 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was wider than that in 1998 (22 points).
