How to Begin a College in the High School Course/Program

Initial Questions for District/School Staff to Consider:

- What courses are students requesting/needing that could be met by a CHS course?
- Will there be sufficient demand for a CHS courses?
 - Many colleges require that a minimum number of high school students register for the college's course before it can be offered as a CHS course in the high school.
- Which teachers are interested in teaching and qualified to teach a CHS course?
 - Many colleges require that high school teachers have a Master's Degree in the content area of the CHS course.
- How will CHS courses complement other dual credit, advanced or college preparatory courses already offered?
- What options exist to help interested students cover the costs associated with taking a CHS course for college credit?
 - Does your school qualify for any of the state-funded subsidies?
 - Districts must apply by July 1 each year for the state subsidies allocated through iGrant #732.
 - o Will your school or students be able to purchase any necessary textbooks?
 - Are there any available resources within the district or community for low- income students?
 - Will the school subsidize students who cannot afford to register for the CHS course's available college credit?
- What is the school or district process and timeline for getting approval to offer a CHS course?

Where to Start:

- Each college has its own process for establishing the contract with a partner district
 - The Washington Student Achievement Council maintains a <u>list of colleges</u> offering a CHS option
- To explore what courses each college offers and to learn more about their process to start a course, go to the institution's webpage and type "college in the high school" into their search box to get more information.
 - Other search words that might work include "high school programs", "('college name') in the high school" or "transfer credit"
