





Building Changes advances equitable responses to homelessness in Washington State, with a focus on children, youth, and families and the systems that serve them.



Building Changes explores how school and housing systems interact with one another to serve students experiencing homelessness through our Education Team's work. We show up for students, encourage cross systems partnerships, and influence policies that shape on the ground practice.

OPSI and Building Changes have partnered, with the help of ARP funds, to provide training for McKinney-Vento school staff and community-based organizations serving students experiencing homelessness. We intend to offer 7 trainings (each one will occur 4 times) through September 2023. This partnership will offer content, tools, and peer networking opportunities to help those supporting students experiencing homelessness across our state.

## McKinney-Vento Refresher: Purpose

### What we know...

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act is a federal law that ensures immediate enrollment and educational stability for homeless children and youth – as defined by OSPI.

The MKV program is designed to address the barriers that homeless children and youth have faced in enrolling, attending, and succeeding in school.

### What we also know...

- This is an under-funded mandate.
- MKV programs are built to meet the needs of their districts and look different in every community.
- This work is dynamic, unpredictable, and requires a wide range of skills.
- It takes a village to serve this student population.
- Staffing does not always match up with the need.



## McKinney-Vento Refresher: Main Tenants

### What we know...

- School access
- School stability
- Support for academic success
- Child-centered, best interest decision making
- Critical role of the local homeless education liaison
- Community partnership and collaboration across systems

### What we also know...

- Every school building has its own culture, staff, and way to serve McKinney-Vento students.
- The needs of MKV students are unique and often requires additional creativity and advocacy.
- Resources are limited.
- Capacity and role limitations are real.



## Who is Eligible?

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act is a federal law that ensures immediate enrollment and educational stability for homeless children and youth – as defined by OSPI.

- · Children who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence
- Sharing the housing of others due to a loss of housing, economic hardship, or similar reason (Doubled-up)
- Living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or campgrounds due to a lack of alternative accommodations
- Living in emergency or shelters
- Abandoned in hospitals
- Living in a public or private place not designed for sleeping
- Living in cars, parks, abandoned buildings, bus or train stations, or other inadequate accommodations
- Migratory children and youth living in any of the above situations

## 3 Key Pieces of Eligibility



### **FIXED:**

Stationary, permanent, and not subject to change



#### **REGULAR:**

Used on a predictable, or consistent basis (e.g. nightly)



### **ADEQUATE:**


Sufficient for meeting both physical and psychological needs typically met in home environments



#### **ASK:**

Can the student go to the same place (FIXED) every night (REGULAR) to sleep in a safe and sufficient space (ADEQUATE)







What does taking a case-by-case student approach mean?

- Every student's situation is unique.
- Listening with genuine curiosity.
- Non-judgmental, check biases



### Check Yourself

- Deserving vs. Undeserving
- Gatekeeping the activity of controlling, and usually limiting, general access to something
- Paternalism interfering with an individual's freedom of choice over their own lives, assumption they know what's best
- White Saviorism describes white people who consider themselves helpers to people of color, and who work from the assumption that they know best what BIPOC folks need.
- Learned Helplessness a learned response to the idea that you can't make a difference no matter what you do (often due to systemic barriers & racism)





### Best Practices for Trauma-Informed Intakes

### Do:

- Build trust first
- Only ask what you need to know to avoid re-traumatization
- Believe survivors of trauma without judgment
- Ask open-ended questions
- Give overview of MKV

### Don't:

- Ask to see proof of residence/lease (against federal & state law)
- Google addresses to assess validity of homeless status
- Make eligibility decisions based on assumptions/personal biases
- Over-investigate, ask others about a family's housing situation (confidentiality)




### Is their housing FIXED, REGULAR, and ADEQUATE?

## Department of Education defines "substandard" as...

Housing that "lacks one of the fundamental utilities such as

- water, electricity, or heat;
- is infested with vermin or mold;
- lacks a basic functional part such as a working kitchen or a working toilet;
- or may present unreasonable dangers to adults, children, or persons with disabilities."






# A family is living in an RV, parking in a diff place most nights. They can often be found at the Walmart parking lot. Is this family MKV eligible?






# A family is living in an RV, renting a mobile home spot. Their RV does not have heat or electricity. Is this family MKV eligible?

# Who is considered an Unaccompanied Youth?

### *Eligibility:*

- Not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian.
- May be residing with a caregiver who does not have legal guardianship
- May be living on their own
- Eligible for services regardless of the reasons that led to separation from family
- They have the right to immediate enrollment without proof of guardianship
- They face many barriers to enrolling, attending and succeeding in school



## Working with Unaccompanied Youth

### Role of Liaisons & School Personnel

- Liaisons must help unaccompanied youth choose and enroll in a school, after considering the youth's wishes, and inform the youth of his or her appeal rights
- School personnel must be made aware of the specific needs of runaway and homeless youth.





## New Laws Supporting Unaccompanied Youth

- State law (RCW 7.70.065) allows McKinney-Vento liaisons, school nurses, and school guidance counselors to provide informed consent for certain types of health care for this population – including immunizations.
- Unaccompanied youth can consent to their own primary health care if they are unable to obtain consent from an MKV liaison
- Includes immunizations and medical, dental, and vision services
- Unaccompanied youth can obtain state ID cards without identifying documents with the support of an MKV liaison





# How can MKV liaisons help young people experiencing homelessness get access to healthcare?

- Many young people are now eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine.
- While consent from a parent or guardian is often required, some young people, such as unaccompanied homeless youth under 18, may not have a parent or guardian available to provide consent.
- State law (RCW 7.70.065) allows McKinney-Vento liaisons, school nurses, and school guidance counselors to provide informed consent for certain types of health care for this population including immunizations.

## How can you provide consent?

- Help the student connect to a youth-friendly vaccine provider.
- Find out how the vaccine provider accepts consent. Verbal? Over the phone? Written? In-person?
- Tell the student you can provide consent to get the COVID-19 vaccine.
- While not required, it may be helpful to print out and provide the informed consent law (RCW 7.70.065) and highlight the portion naming school nurses, school counselors, and homeless student liaisons.
- While not required, OSPI has provided a helpful <u>Sample Informed Consent</u> for Health Care Authorization form. You can print this, fill it out, and provide this to the young person or vaccine provider.

## Building Point of Contact in Legislation



#### **RCW 28A.320.142**


Unaccompanied and homeless youth—Building point of contact—Duty of district liaison for students experiencing homelessness.

- (1) Each K-12 public school in the state must establish a building point of contact in each elementary school, middle school, and high school. These points of contact must be appointed by the principal of the designated school and are responsible for identifying homeless and unaccompanied homeless youth and connecting them with the school district's liaison for students experiencing homelessness. The school district homeless student liaison is responsible for training building points of contact.
- (2) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall make available best practices for choosing and training building points of contact to each school district.

## Role of McKinney-Vento Building Point of Contact

- Washington is currently the only state where this is required by law.
- Identify & support students experiencing homelessness and in care.
- Provide building-level supports to students and families experiencing homelessness.
- Help school-level staff understand student needs and rights and inform them about homelessness and McKinney-Vento services.
- Coordinate with the school district McKinney-Vento liaison to identify and serve students experiencing homelessness.
