Reevaluations	No – unless the student is already enrolled or intends to reenroll within the district	Yes – see, OSERS Q&A B-8; but no duty to reevaluate if student is currently enrolled with resident district	
IEPs	Yes – but only if the student has enrolled full-time or part-time with the district	No – unless the student has enrolled as a nonresident Choice transfer into the district	
Services Plans	No – unless private school is located within district boundaries (see next column)	Yes – available to K-12 students eligible for SPED enrolled in private schools within district boundaries unless student is currently enrolled with resident district and has an IEP	Eligible K-12 students cannot have an IEP and Services Plan at the same time
Proportionate Share Count	No – unless private school is located within district boundaries (see next column)	Yes – even if the student is part-time enrolled with resident district and receiving services via an IEP	

¹ – A "private school" is defined as any nonprofit elementary or secondary school. (WAC <u>Section 392-172A-01145</u>). Students attending private for-profit schools or private preschool programs are not included in the proportionate share count or eligible for equitable services. The district where the student resides, however, does still have "child find" and FAPE obligations for students enrolled in private for-profit schools or private preschool programs.
