Second Substitute House Bill 1216 (2019–20) states: "The purpose of this committee is to advise the Superintendent, the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction's School Safety Center, the Regional Safety Centers, school districts, and public and private schools on all matters related to comprehensive school safety and student well-being".

School safety and Student Well-being for Native Students and Educators

Facilitated by Jerad Koepp, North Thurston Schools and 2022 Washington Teacher of the Year
