8. Evaluations of program/major findings:

So far, the School Safety & Student Well-Being team has started measuring safety & security staffing levels at schools and districts. The first collection of this data took place in the spring of 2022 for the 2021-2022 school year. The data collection was done as a survey, with 96% of districts responding. From this survey, we learned that there were 125 School Districts that employed safety & security staff. 88 of these districts employ School Resource Officers (SROs). There are 856 total safety & security staff employed in the state. 76.5% of these staff are district employees, 19.5% are SROs, and 4% are private security. Among districts that have safety & security staff, the average student to safety & security staff ratio is 1,465 to 1.

CEDARS changes are set to roll out in the 2022-2023 school year, which will allow monitoring of incidents of safety & security staff involvement with students (resulting in discipline, arrest, or use of force).

9. Major challenges faced by the program:

CEDARS changes for the 2022-2023 school year only allow safety & security staff involvement to be recorded if it is attached to an incident of exclusionary discipline or isolation or restraint. We are planning to implement changes for the 2023-2024 school year that will allow involvement to be recorded regardless of whether it takes place in the context of exclusionary discipline or isolation or restraint.

10. Future opportunities:

Changes to CEDARS collections, as described in the preceding sections.

11. Statutory and/or budget language:

ESSB 5693, Sec. 501(4)(s) - \$49,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal year 2022 and \$49,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal year 2023 are provided solely for implementation of Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1214 (K-12 safety & security serv.).
