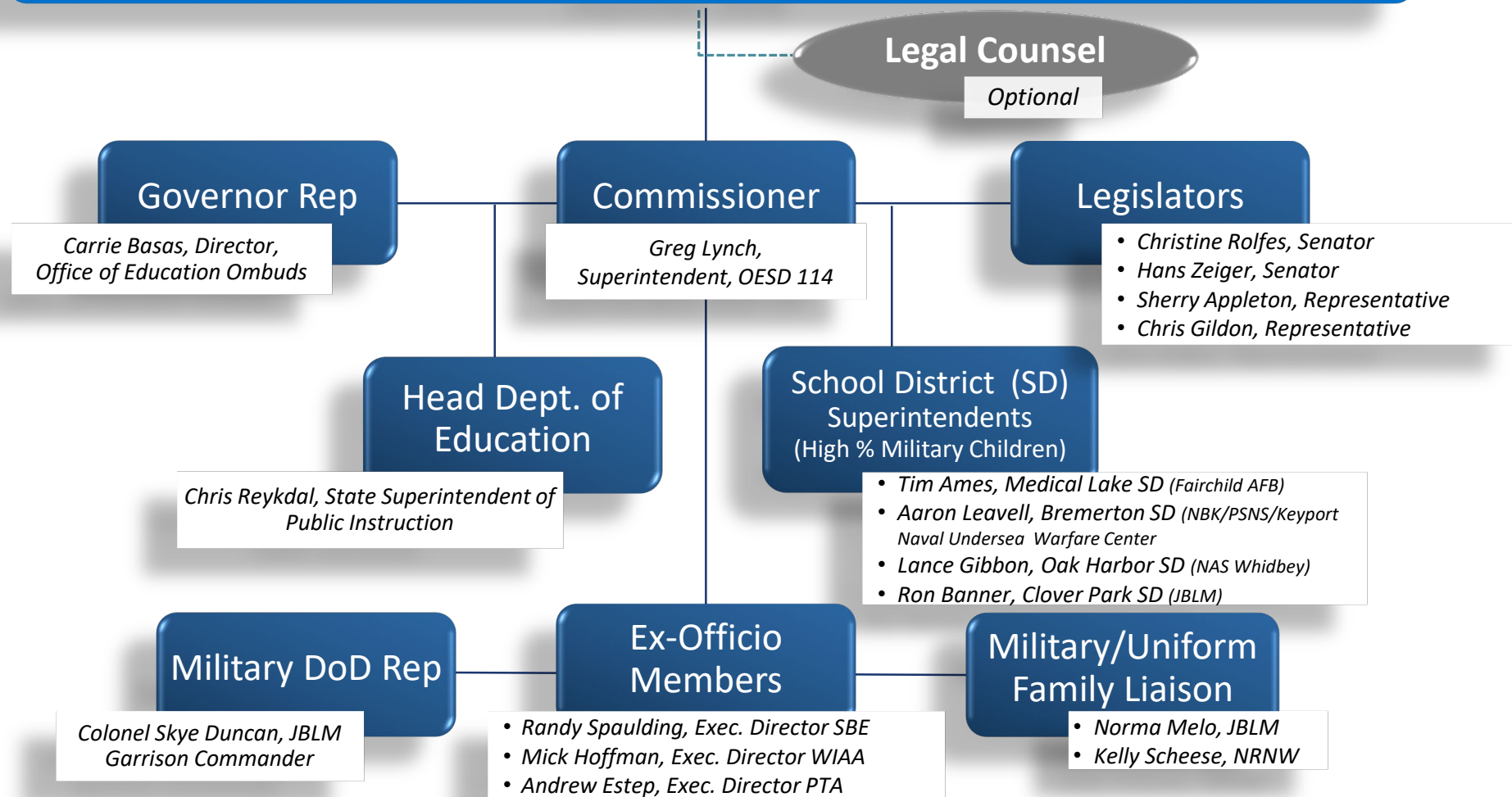


Washington Compact Involvement & History

- WA MIC3 Task Force submitted a recommendation to Legislature in Dec. 2008 recommending WA join the Compact.
- Washington State joined the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children (MIC3) in 2009.
- Substitute Senate Bill 5248 (2009) was passed, placing the major components of the Compact into Washington State Law legislation included a “sunset” clause for potential renewal during the 2015 legislative session.
- State MIC3 Committee submitted report and recommendation in Dec. 2014 to Legislature to sustain Compact – “approved” during the 2015 legislative session.

Why the Interstate Compact?



The Goal: *To remove barriers to educational success imposed upon children of federal uniformed families because of frequent moves and deployment of parents.*

The Compact Applies To Children of:

- ▶ **Active duty members of uniformed services (includes activated Guard and Reserves)**
- ▶ Medically discharged members and veterans (for 1 year)
- ▶ Members who die on active duty (for 1 year)

Does NOT apply to children of:

- ▶ Inactive members of the national guard and military reserves
- ▶ Members of the uniformed services now retired
- ▶ Veterans of the uniformed services
- ▶ Other U.S. DoD personnel and other federal agency civilian and contract employees

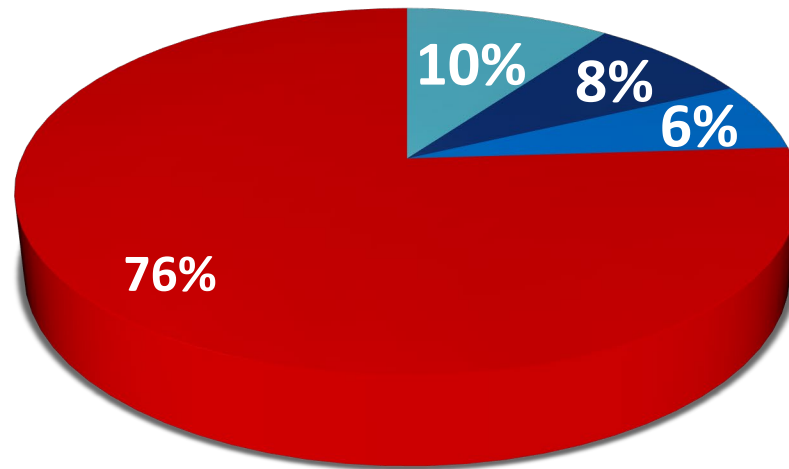

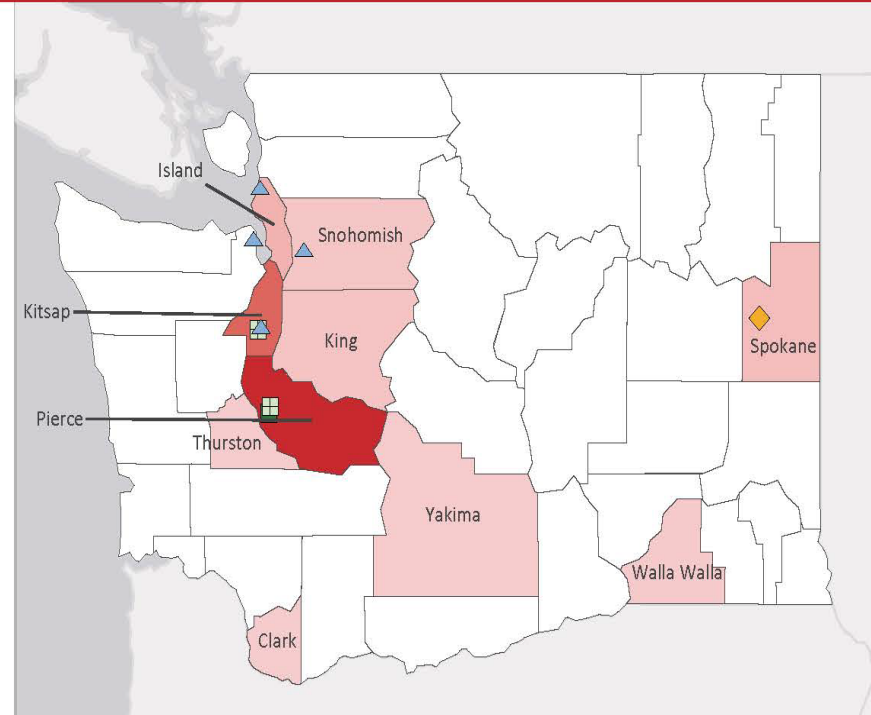

- All of this deconflicted, messaged & coordinated w/community partners

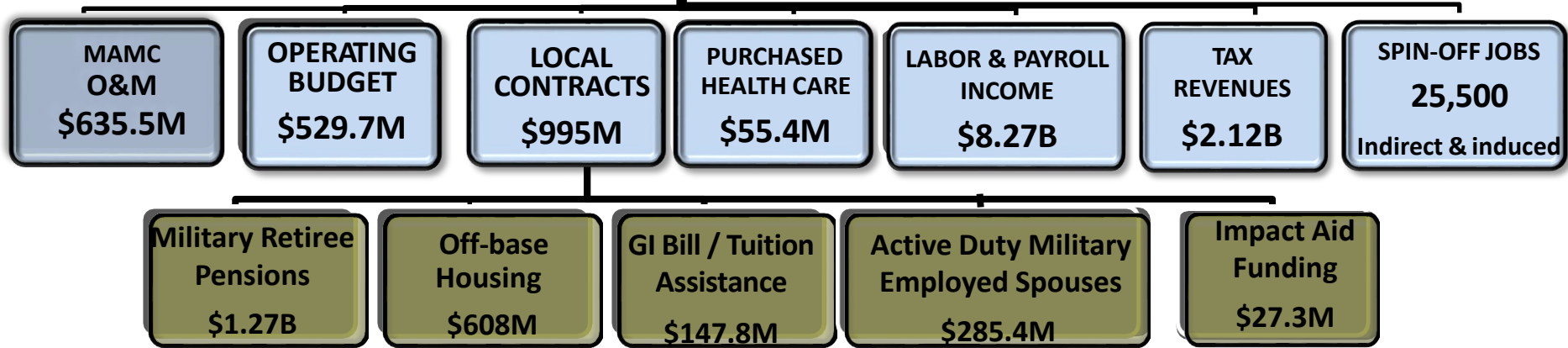




JBLM Economic Benefits



2020 JBLM REGIONAL ECONOMIC IMPACT \$12.1B (OF \$13.9B STATE IMPACT)



IMPROVEMENTS AND BETTER FIDELITY OVER 2018 REI STUDY

- Initial 2018 study was constrained by time and limited to analyzing the JBLM workforce, defense contracts, and operations and the study focused primarily on the impacts of the JBLM workforce.
 - Estimated impact was \$8.3B to \$9.2B but likely up to \$11.4B based on incomplete Retiree Data, out of state mortgage tax data and unknown true impact of "Economic Spinoff"
- 2020 Regional Economic Impact Analysis includes more data with greater granularity
 - Examples of new data include: Retiree pensions, GI Bill/Tuition Assistance (TA), Basic Allowance for Housing (H)
- Access to IMPLAN Simulations more accurately estimate indirect and induced effects and incorporates cross-region impacts to determine the impact of spin-off jobs, military retirees, military families, transitioning service members, military working spouses, etc...
 - An accurate assessment spin-off (indirect and induced) job impact was accomplished compared to 2018's study

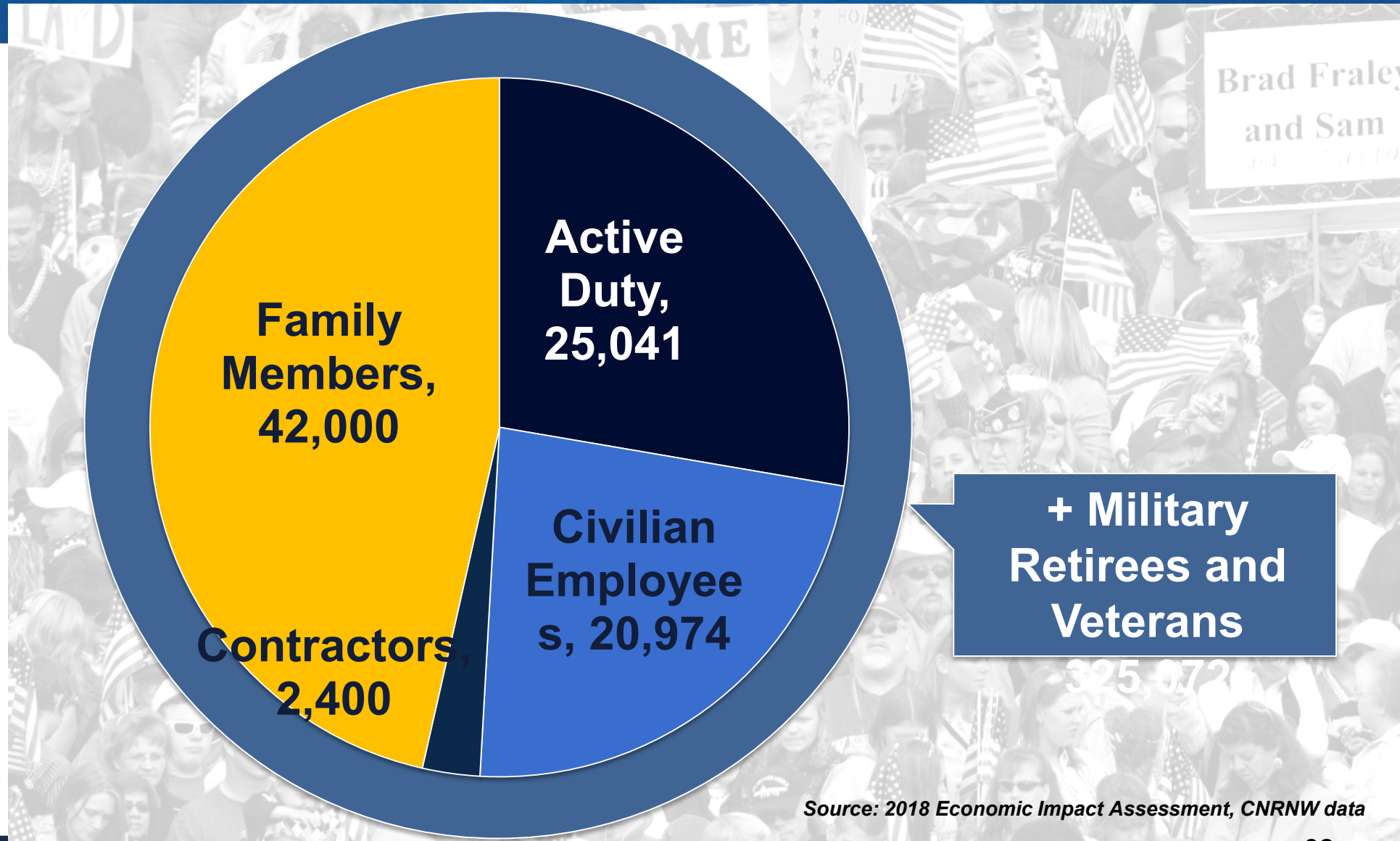

WHO WE ARE

- The Defense-State Liaison Office, or DSLO, was established by Office of the Undersecretary of Defense for Personnel and Readiness in 2004.
- DSLO is sanctioned to address designated Personnel and Readiness Key Issues with **state policymakers** to change laws and policies to improve military family well-being.
- **In the past decade, we've worked with state policymakers to enact nearly 700 bills that make life better for the military community.**
- Helped Pass MIC3 Legislation in all 50 States



VIRTUAL SCHOOLS

“States can minimize disruptions in education for military children by allowing them to participate in technology-based educational opportunities (virtual schools) while transitioning between duty stations.”

Eligible military children could participate **without a residence requirement** if moving to/ **from the school** within impacted states and for the gaining school, to accept credits taken through the virtual program.

While the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children provides opportunities for assistance during transition, it does not address virtual school support.

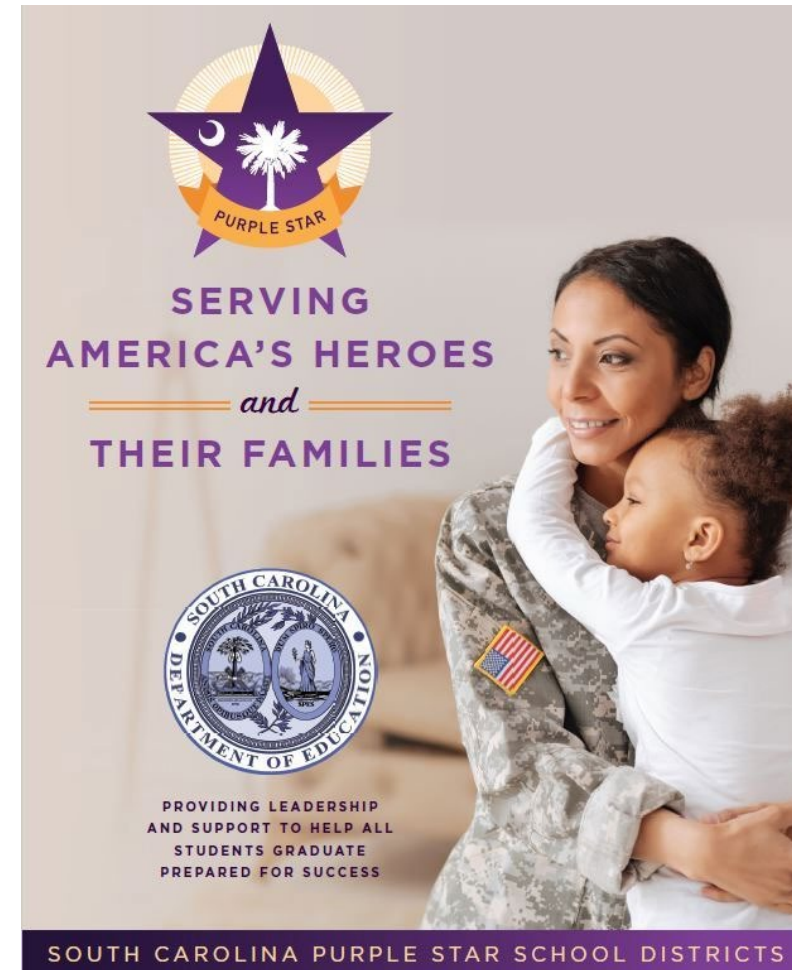


PURPLE STAR SCHOOLS

The **Purple Star** Designation is awarded to military-friendly schools that have demonstrated a major commitment to students and families connected to our nation's military.

PURPLE STAR SCHOOLS

Purple Star started with simple requirements important to military families and students:

- Designated school staff as a point of contact or liaison for military students and families.
- Required professional development for staff assigned liaison on military-connected student issues.
- School must have a designated page on its website featuring resources and information for military families.
- Purple Star designations can also recognize schools that connect their student body to the meaning and importance of military service.

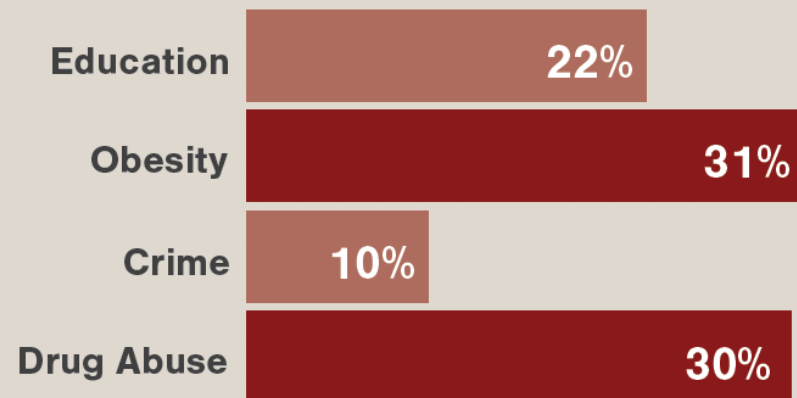


The problem Mission: Readiness addresses in WA

Nationally, 71% of young Americans between the ages of 17 and 24 could not qualify for military service (70% in WA state)

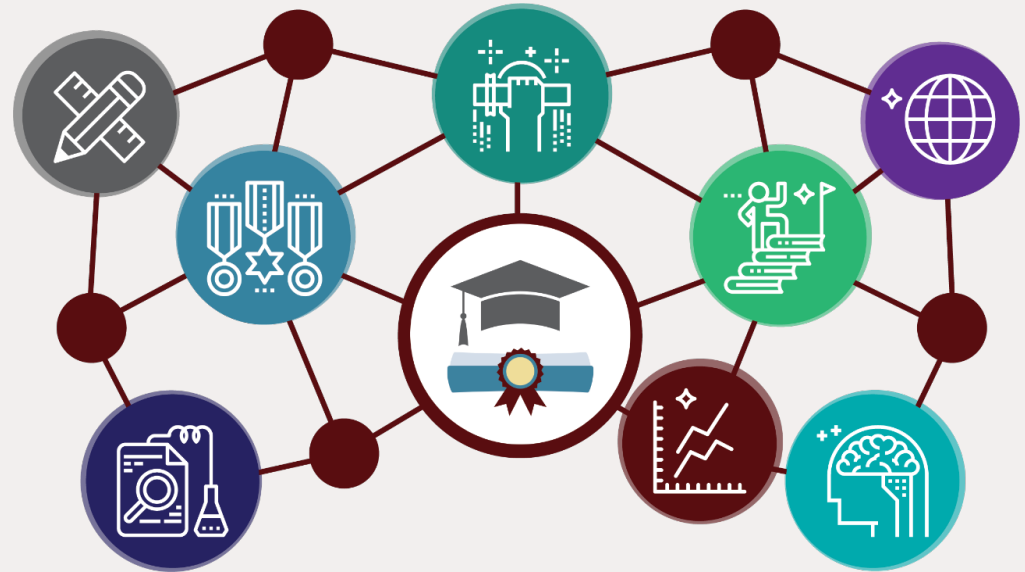
Washington students complete three components to achieve the high school diploma of their design.



The purpose of a high school diploma is to declare that a student is ready for success in postsecondary education, gainful employment, and citizenship, and is equipped with the skills to be a lifelong learner. (RCW 28A.230.090)

Graduation Pathway Options: Background

- **State Assessment**
- **Dual Credit**
- **AP/IB/Cambridge**
 - **Assessment Score**
 - **Course Grade**
- **SAT/ACT**
- **Transition Course in ELA and math Combination:**
- **Combination of at least one ELA and one math option of those option above.**
- **Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB)**
- **CTE Sequence**



Class of 2020

- Graduation Pathways
 - Most student met the State test requirement
 - Dual credit, AP courses, and SAT were the other most common
 - Just over 10% met the CTE pathway
 - Just below 3% met the ASVAB pathway
- Credit and Pathway Waivers:
 - Credits: ~3,000 students received waivers for an average of 2 classes each
 - Pathways: ~9,000 students received waivers
 - ~0.5% indicated enlistment in the military



Addressing Challenges Education Delivery in an Emergency

The Board adopted rules to:

- Allow flexibility in how districts can meet hour and day requirements
- Allow private schools to offer fully online program
- Clarify in rule flexibility to provide credit based on mastery of learning standards.
- Allow for greater flexibility to waive Washington State History (non-credit requirement).

Graduation requirements proposals

- I. Strengthen ability to respond in emergencies**
- II. Adding a portfolio option to the graduation pathways
- III. Adapting the credit framework to strengthen relevance
- IV. Supporting mastery-based learning

Strengthen ability to respond in emergencies

- Request ongoing authority to grant necessary waivers of certain graduation requirements to address emergency situations
 - Credit graduation requirements
 - Pathway requirement
- Preserve concepts:
 - Good faith effort before considering use of waiver
 - On track to graduate / reasonably expected to complete
 - Administered at local level on individual student basis
 - Equity consideration
- Define through rulemaking:
 - Eligibility criteria
 - Limitations
 - Application, data collection requirements
 - Communication expectations

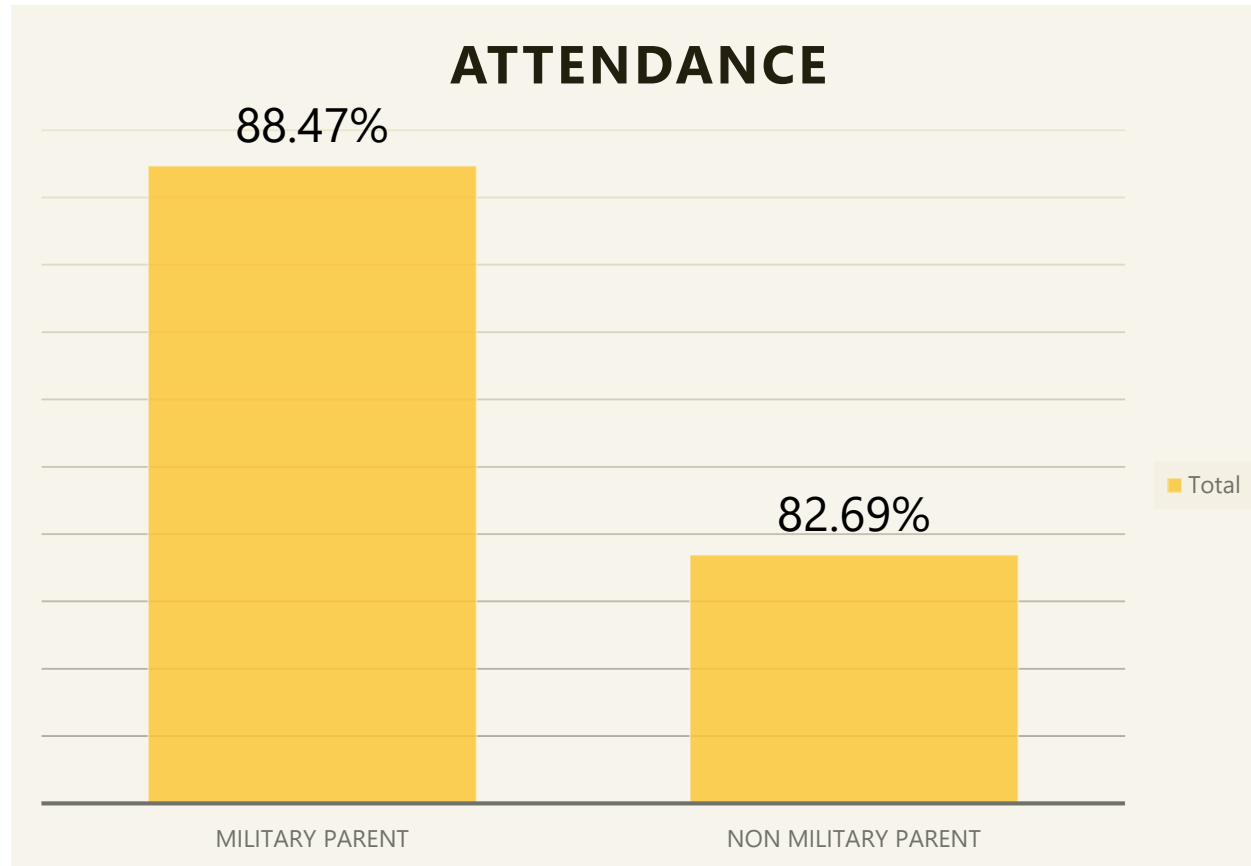

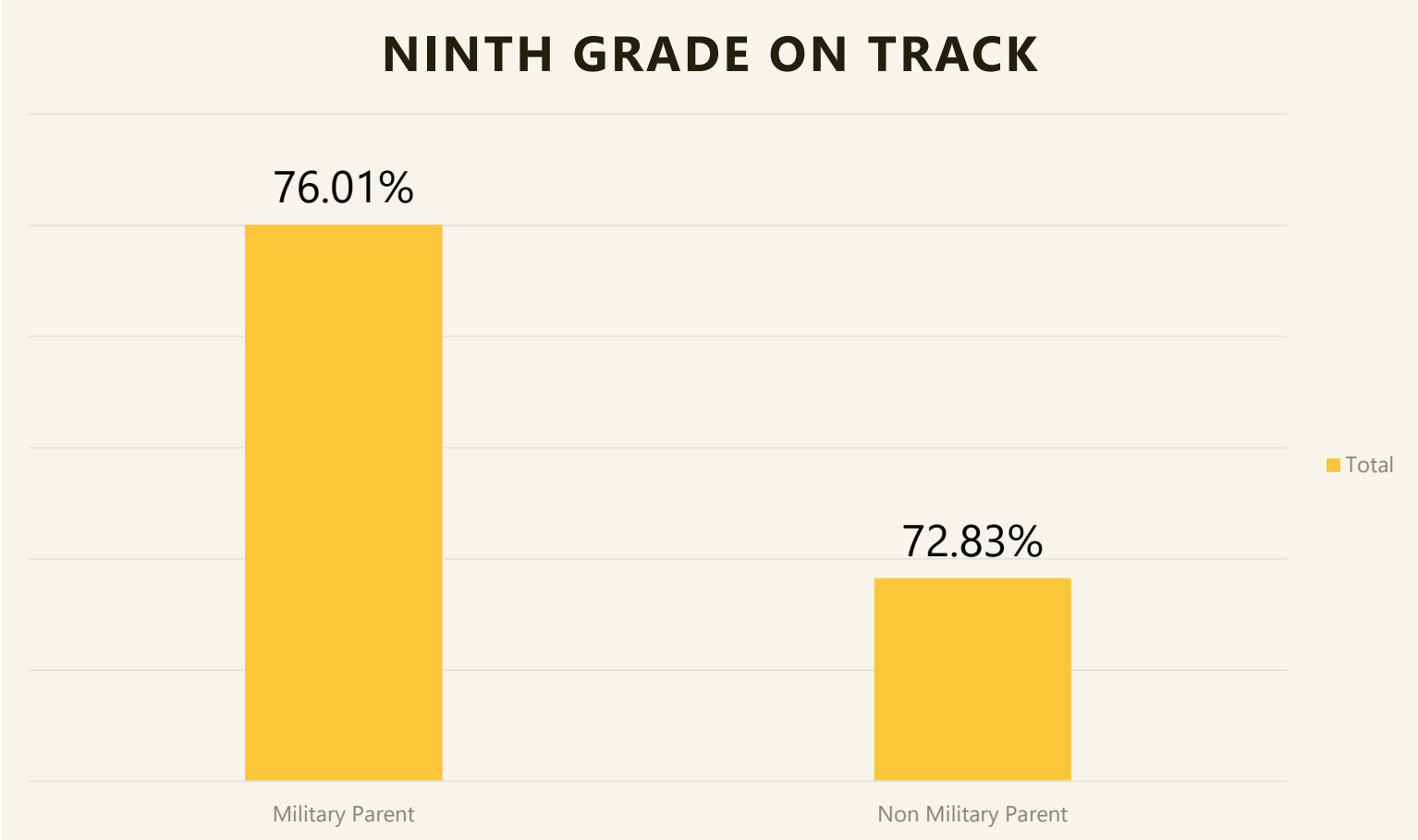

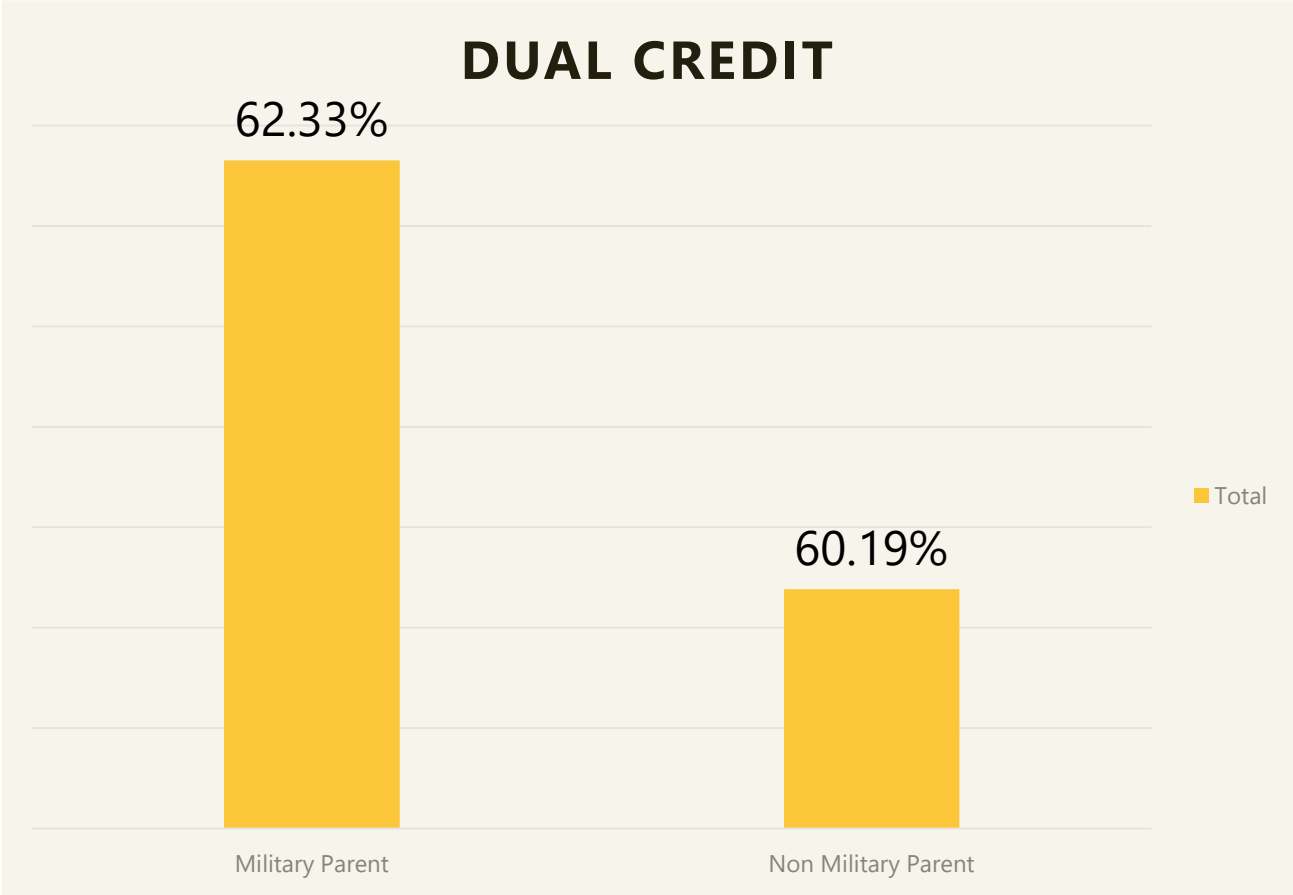
Regular Attendance by MP/Non-MP
