

Functions of SEAC: The Special Education Advisory Council (SEAC) is established in order to help facilitate the provision of special education and related services to meet the unique needs of students eligible for special education services by <u>WAC 392-172A-07060</u>:

- a) Advising the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and making recommendations on all matters related to special education and specifically advise the State Superintendent of unmet needs within the state in the education of students eligible for special education services.
- b) Commenting publicly on any rules or regulations proposed by the state regarding the education of students eligible for special education services.
- c) Advising the state in developing evaluations and reporting such information as may assist the state in its data requirements under section 618 of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).
- d) Advising the state in developing corrective action plans to address findings identified in federal monitoring reports under Part B of the IDEA.
- e) Advising the state in developing and implementing policies relating to the coordination of services for students eligible for special education services.
- f) Reviewing state due process findings and decisions.

The SEAC priorities in 2017–18 include:

- 1. Continue to advocate, monitor, and support funding increases for basic education consistent with the Supreme Court's most recent timetable.
- 2. Review state-identified compliance issues regarding measurable annual individualized education program (IEP) goals, sufficient evaluations, and service delivery issues, as well as discipline and procedural protections.
- 3. Continue to refine and implement the Consistency Index Initiative within the state.
- 4. Positively influence the implementation of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) on behalf of students eligible for special education services.
- 5. Maintain SEAC's involvement in the development of the social/emotional learning standards.
- 6. Explore the professional development systems for regular and special education staff including certificated and classified staff.

Special Education Priorities:

- 1.) Leadership to support students with disabilities (including increased collaboration and ownership regarding students with disabilities of school administrators and staff) and coordinated efforts with community organizations to improve results and reduce disproportionality
- 2.) Growth mindset and increasing expectations of students with disabilities (e.g., standards, instruction, graduation, assessments, attendance, and IEP-related decisions)
- 3.) Evidence-based instruction/interventions/practices within an MTSS framework leading to increased access and progress in Washington grade-level learning standards
- 4.) Common PD for general educators, special educators, paraeducators, administrators, and parents/families (e.g., IEP team members) addressing all of the above
- 5.) Resource allocation (braiding, consolidated application, reducing costs for administrative tasks, increasing direct support to students, data-based decision making)
- 6.) Teacher recruitment and retention (including teacher preparation programs for administrators, general educators, special educators, and related service providers) around instruction and support for students with disabilities, including all of the above
