# **Reviewer Comments:**

### Reviewer 101

Content is accurate with a very robust SEL section. Many of the exercises would be helpful for building SEL skills in the K-6 population. However, lack of multi-media material makes the content less accessible for diverse learners. Would not use in my classroom for this reason.

#### Reviewer 102

The 7 root safety strategies fort 3rd graders may be a little too complicated to grasp. I am worried that it may be too much information for a young child to remember. However, I like that there is a lot of material to prepare the instructors such as a letter to the parents, activity sheets, lesson plans, etc.

#### Reviewer 210

This curriculum is good overall, but I would recommend adding content on gender roles/stereotypes and more gender inclusive language (they/them pronouns, etc.). The curriculum also does not do enough to challenge systemic power and oppression, privilege, etc.
