- Analyze motives and interests

- Students will complete their graphic organizer and use the evidence to create a claim about the role of tribal sovereignty in the establishment and clean up efforts of the Hanford Nuclear Reservation.
- Students evidence and claims will be used to complete the <u>Humans and the Environment</u> OSPI-developed assessment for Social Studies.

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
