- Review the purpose of SELAC
- OSPI (and PESB) Happenings Across Divisions (not comprehensive)
  - Updating the Standards: Charge by Supt. Reykdal to ensure that SEL is embedded in the updating of the standards (guidance, example lessons, verbiage around the standards). ELA, Science, and Math standards (2023 update)
  - Adding SEL Guidance across many divisions: comprehensive counselor plans – SEL requirement, Title programs encouraging SEL in plans, Open Education Resources – projects across content areas, ONE Tribal Consultation including SEL, Early Learning updating SEL Pathways document, Behavioral Health & Suicide Prevention, PE & Health
  - Integrating SEL into Programs: academic integration project, Bridge to College Math, Outdoor Education, Healthy Youth Survey
  - Professional Development: SEL online module moving to Canvas, Project AWARE, GATE webinars
  - o Communications: working on SEL promotional videos
  - Teams working to integrate SEL: Braiding Team Essential Practice Project,
     Mental and Behavioral Health Collaboration Team
  - SEL Team will offer: monthly coaching/office hours and professional development, CASEL Exchange conference presentations, SEL website updates, SEL online module moved to Canvas and updated, continued work with Office of Native Education, SEL Week activities (and Governor's Proclamation), district and school staff testimony collection

## **SEL Advisory Committee Priority Areas**

Sarah Butcher, Caryn Park, Xyzlora Brownell, Tammy Bolen & Nick Yoder Three Priority Areas Jamboard

- Assessment (Caryn): In the breakout rooms we will discuss any member ideas, bring back or emphasize from our subcommittee work/assessment. There is a separate group for implementation evaluation.
- Implementation (Tammy): looking at adult SEL implementation
- Family/Community Engagement (Sarah & Xyzlora): Reflecting on the report



- Conversations in breakout rooms, notes collected on the Jamboard
- Key takeaways (page 4 on the Jamboard):
  - Farheen: first time here at SELAC, given a lot of hope. Focused on funding and timeline of any of these plans so they can come to fruition.
  - Terique: in the Implementation group, spoke of teacher (and administrator) burnout and turnover since the pandemic; how SEL adult capacity can affect students' learning as well.
  - o Tammy: in all three breakout rooms, there was a concern expressed around how to evaluate SEL implementation. The difficulty is how to evaluate such different methods of SEL implementation when some districts are using SEL programs, and some are embedding it into content areas. Appreciated Mona Johnson's comment on embedding SEL on the OSPI level in school improvement; looking at the federal requirements for school improvement with SEL. Mona Halcomb spoke on the consultation process and how to share SEL in that work.

## **SEL Exchange Recap**

Meeting Reflections Jamboard

AIR Brief (Instructional Practices that Integrate Equity-Centered Social, Emotional, and academic Learning)

- June 27, 2023 we held our SEL Network Exchange event at Highline College. Close to 100 educational professionals and community members attended.
- Key topics discussed at SEL Network Exchange:
  - Current SEL practices (panel discussion): school nurse, classroom teacher, and SEL facilitator. Richland School District talked about building community; formed a committee, looking at MTSS, identifying goals/priorities. Classroom teacher: looked at anchor texts.
    - Leiani Sherwin: Attending the event gave me a lot of hope. There are districts and a lot of folks out there working on this.
  - Indigenous Social Emotional Developmental Perspectives & Education Practice: Arlie Neskahi presented on intergenerational traumas past/present, culturally sustaining practices that families and communities and culture can bring to social emotional development.
    - Leiani Sherwin: Really enjoyed this. Hope that what Arlie spoke about can be a resource for districts. Could we create a recording?



- Lauren Macdonald: Agreed with Leiani. Second time hearing Arlie present. Really think building/district could benefit from hearing this. Would love a recording/resource.
- Tammy Bolen: We have asked for Indigenous Indicators. Districts have gone back to look at their practices (standards and benchmarks). We will circle back to those teams to see how that is progressing. Something that came out of the 6/27 discussion was how to embed CCDI Standards.
- Academic Learning is Social & Emotional: Resources to Support
  Washington Educators in Integrating Equity-Centered Social, Emotional,
  and Academic Learning: We will cover this more in-depth next month. Ken
  Turner led an interactive portion where we got to get up and practice an
  SEL activity. There is a release of some new training; the materials will be
  ready for us soon.
  - Laurie Dils: So excited about the package of tools, a team from OPSI and AIR, put together. We are shifting to a new platform for OSPI with some of our professional development materials. We will let you know when they are available. Helping educators understand how closely SEL is aligned with already established standards.
- SEL Peer Exchange: work in the Professional Learning Network highlighted importance of being able to share and learn from their peers. There were 7 topic areas around the room (including SELAC sharing around the legislative report; Arlie Neskahi and Sarah Pierce on Indigenous Practices, Leiani and Debra on adult capacity, SEL curriculum, Mental Health and Suicide Prevention, School and District Climate, etc.)
- State-Wide Collaboration: Culturally Responsive SEL for Educators: Jisu Ryu, Leiani Sherwin, and Debbie Tully looked at responding to SEL in the classroom, moving beyond curriculum, how we prepare and support the educators. Connecting this to the burnout/turn over that Terique mentioned earlier.
  - Leiani: shared a vision of working with higher education, K–12, and the community to incorporate SEL. We shared how higher education is working to prepare teachers and how those teachers are then going into districts. SEL as a lens, more than the curriculum, that teachers use as they go through their whole day.
- SELAC Advisory Reflections/Next Steps from SEL Network Exchange (Tammy Bolen) had some recurring themes:
  - Gathering stories of SEL is important and that they reach families



- Not everyone is using Washington SEL standards
- Seeing pockets of district changing systems (training bus drivers, embedding it in MTSS, policies and procedures)
- Heard a lot about SEL happening in elementary but we didn't hear as much about it happening in high school
  - Lots of requests asking how we can help support high school in SEL. What does embedding SEL in high school look like?
- Lots of struggles around SEL "buy in" and a focus on capacity.
- Family Engagement and co-creation is crucial to holding schools accountable
  - Sarah Butcher: there's a lot of work happening in schools which is exciting and overwhelming (system change). Partnering/co-creating helps hold everyone accountable. Shared understanding and definition of success is needed.
  - Lauren Macdonald: when we talk about teacher capacity and selfefficacy: SEL is embedded in every part of the school day, no matter where you're at. Educators seemed excited about the resources shared.
- Answers to these questions captured on the Meeting Reflection Jamboard:
  - How can this information inform our work?
  - Does this bring to mind any needed legislative recommendations?
     (Policy changes, creation, or removing of policies)

- Caryn Park introduction: SELAC co-chair, represent Commission for Asian Pacific American Affairs, faculty member at Antioch University – Seattle in the School of Education, teacher preparation program. Has a background in early childhood education. Belief that SEL should continue K-12 and is super important to adults as well. Has noticed a huge sense of relief for beginning teachers that they will be supported in SEL for children and adult capacity building.
