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PURPOSE/BACKGROUND

Collection of free and reduced-price meal applications associated with United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Child Nutrition Programs, is the traditional method utilized to collect household income information. However, there are several situations where use of free and reduced-price meal applications is not allowed. This includes Local Education Agencies (LEAs) operating the National School Lunch Program's (NSLP) Community Eligibility Provision (CEP), or a Provision 2 school in a non-base year and schools or districts, and programs that do not operate the NSLP/SBP (i.e., virtual schools, some skill centers, etc.). Please review the

<u>Provision 2 Reference Sheet</u> for more information about base year and non-base year operations.

In these situations, instead of the meal application, the Family Income Survey (FIS) should be distributed to collect household income information. The data collected on the FIS can help schools receive funding for several state need-based funding mechanisms such as E-Rate and the Learning Assistance Program (LAP). Information collected by the FIS may also be used to qualify students for additional support and reduced fees. OSPI has created the *'It's More Than the Family Income Survey Toolkit'* to help districts promote the importance of families completing the Family Income Survey each year.

OSPI updated the Family Income Survey for school year 2023–24 to include more culturally inclusive language, especially around the term 'poverty.' The updated FIS also helps to accurately capture all eligibility categories, such as students experiencing homelessness, in foster care, or receiving Migrant Education Services. FAMILY INCOME SURVEY GUIDELINES

The collection of household income through the Family Income Survey (FIS) is a state requirement. To ensure consistent collection, processing and reporting of data, schools should follow the below guidelines:

- FIS materials must be updated annually to match USDA Income Eligibility Guidelines.
 USDA Income Eligibility Guidelines are published annually and are effective July 1–June 30.
- The FIS should be distributed to families annually after July 1. A best practice is to include the FIS in "back to school" packets or when collecting other annual forms.
- The FIS should be made available to households throughout the year, and for students that transfer in during the school year.
- To accompany the FIS, *Letters to Households* templates that highlight the importance of continuing to collect household income information, are available to use see <u>Available</u> <u>Materials section below</u>.
- Materials must be made available in a language parents and guardians understand. Work with district officials to ensure you are providing meaningful access to the community your organization serves. Use the <u>Limited English Proficiency Reference Sheet</u> for more information.
- Students in households with an income comparable to free or reduced-price meal eligibility should be categorized with the corresponding FIS designation in the Comprehensive Education Data and Research System (CEDARS), Appendix X.

- The FIS should be processed within ten working days and reported in CEDARS by March 31 each year to ensure proper data collection.
- The FIS is not a federal requirement, therefore staff time to distribute, collect, and process the FIS cannot be paid for with non-profit school food service account funds. LEAs may use non-food service staff to complete this work or fund food service staff completing tasks related to the FIS with another funding source.
- Although the Family Income Survey is a state requirement, the USDA Eligibility manual for School Meals may be utilized for determining what households should count as income.
- The FIS is not subject to verification.
- Families should be informed of the availability of breakfast and lunch at no cost, in applicable schools.

Direct Certification

LEAs must continue to perform direct certification at least monthly, regardless of use of the FIS. Direct Certification is the process LEAs use to certify categorically eligible children for free or reduced-price meals without further application. Students may be directly certified based on participation in assistance programs, including but not limited to Basic Food and Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF).

Consent to Share documentation must be obtained for directly certified students prior to sharing eligibility status. Best practices include conducting direct certification frequently at the beginning of the school year and sending a Consent to Share form with the notification of eligibility annually.

Notification of Eligibility Determination

Requirements for notifying households of eligibility are dependent on Direct Certification or the submission of a FIS.

- Households with children who are directly certified **must** be notified either verbally or in writing.
- Households who submit a FIS with income comparable to free or reduced-price meal eligibility **may** be notified either verbally or in writing.

Available Materials

Resources on the FIS and prototype letters can be found on the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) <u>CEP & Provision 2 webpage</u>:

- <u>2023–24 Family Income Survey</u>: This survey allows LEAs to collect household income information in place of the free and reduced-price meal application. The FIS has been translated into 10 languages.
- <u>Letter to Households CEP Schools:</u> This letter is for LEAs operating CEP at one or more schools.
- <u>Letter to Households Provision 2 Schools</u>: This letter is for LEAs operating a Provision 2 non-base year for breakfast and lunch at one or more schools.
- <u>Notice of Eligibility for Reduced Fees Direct Certification</u>: This letter may be used to notify households of student(s) who have been directly certified and may be eligible for reduced fees.
- <u>Notice of Eligibility for Reduced Fees Family Income Survey</u>: This letter may be used to notify households of student(s) who may be eligible for reduced fees based off their reported income on a FIS.

Consent to Share Child Nutrition Program Eligibility Information for Other School Programs

Disclosure of eligibility information to programs not outlined in the National School Lunch Act (NSLA) requires parent or guardian consent. These programs include local programs and activities, such as fees for band, athletics, field trips, or Associated Student Body (ASB).

Parent or guardian consent must be obtained annually and prior to disclosure – households must also be able to limit consent to only those programs with which they wish to share information. If a child is directly certified, the LEA must have a system in place to obtain consent from these households before sharing their information.

Local Education Agencies that gather parent or guardian consent for local programs that offer reduced fees for Students from low-income families can use the <u>Consent to Share Child</u> <u>Nutrition Program Eligibility Information for Other School Programs form</u>. This form may be included with the letter to households sent home at the beginning of the school year or with the letter notifying households they have been directly certified or found eligible for reduced fees based off their reported income.

Non-Discrimination Statement

As the FIS is used for purposes outside of the USDA Child Nutrition Programs, program materials related to the collection and distribution of the FIS should not include the USDA Nondiscrimination Statement. LEAs should include the districts' nondiscrimination statement on all program materials widely disseminated to students and families.

Assurance of Civil Rights Compliance

The Sponsor hereby agrees that it will comply with: i. Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. 2000d et seq.); ii. By accepting this assurance, the Sponsor agrees to compile data, maintain records, and submit records and reports as required, to permit effective enforcement of nondiscrimination laws and permit authorized USDA personnel during hours of program operation to review and copy such records, books, and accounts, access such facilities and interview such personnel as needed to ascertain compliance with the nondiscrimination laws. If there are any violations of this assurance, the Department of Agriculture, FNS, shall have the right to seek judicial enforcement of this assurance. This assurance is binding on the Sponsor, its successors, transferees and assignees as long as it receives assistance or retains possession of any assistance from USDA.
