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PURPOSE/BACKGROUND

All Local Education Agencies (LEAs) participating in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) and School Breakfast Program (SBP) must make free and reduced-price meals available to all qualifying students. Meal application materials help LEAs determine eligibility status and must be distributed before the school year begins, as well as made available to all households throughout the year. Materials are updated each year to reflect changes to income guidelines and program regulations.

FREE AND REDUCED-PRICE MEAL APPLICATIONS AND MATERIALS

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) annually releases updated income guidelines. Income guidelines effective July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2024 and accompanying materials can be found on the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) Free and Reduced-Price Information webpage.

Letters to Households and Meal Applications must be distributed to families each school year after July 1. These materials inform families of the meal programs available to the students and that meals may be available at a free or reduced-price. USDA governs requirements around meal applications including the following requirements:

- Materials must be made available in a language parents and guardians understand. Use the <u>Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Reference Sheet</u> for more information.
- LEAs must distribute the state prototype Letter to Households and Application for Free and Reduced-Price Meals **or** the USDA prototypes. Visit <u>USDA's Applying for Free and</u> <u>Reduced-Price School Meals Information webpage</u> for additional prototypes.
- Applications, scanned and online, must be updated to reflect current regulations. Use the <u>Meal Application Materials Reference Sheet</u> for more details.

The Letter to Households should include the name of the hearing official and the individual who can provide alternative means of communication to persons who require program information in other formats.

House Bill 1238 requires LEAs to provide meals at no cost to students enrolled at elementary schools where 40% or more of enrolled children are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Schools operating under this requirement must continue to collect meal applications and claim meals according to free, reduced-price or paid category. Additional details of HB1238 can be found in <u>Bulletin 045-23: Meals for Washington Students – House Bill 1238</u>.

Family Income Survey

There are several situations where use of free and reduced-price meal applications is not allowed. This includes LEAs operating the NSLP Community Eligibility Provision (CEP), or a Provision 2 school in a non-base year and schools or districts, and programs that do not operate the NSLP/SBP (i.e., virtual schools, some skill centers, etc.). Please review the <u>Provision 2 Reference Sheet</u> for more information about base year and non-base year operations.

In these situations, instead of the meal application, the Family Income Survey (FIS) should be distributed to collect household income information. Information and details about the FIS can be found on the <u>Community Eligibility Provision and Provision 2 webpage</u>.

Available Materials

The following prototype application materials are available on the OSPI Child Nutrition Services (CNS) <u>Meal Application and Verification Information webpage</u>:

- <u>2023–24 Application for Free and Reduced-Price Meals</u>: The application allows households to apply for free and reduced-price meals.
- <u>Letter to Households Public Schools</u>: This letter is for public school districts, charter schools, and state-tribal education compact schools.
- Letter to Households Private Schools/Residential Child Care Institutions (RCCIs): This letter is for private schools and RCCIs.
- Letter to Households Non-pricing/Provision: This letter is for Provision 2 programs operating a base year, non-pricing programs, as well as for elementary schools qualified under HB 1238. Provision 2 programs can only send applications for free and reducedprice meals during the base year. Provision 2 schools during non-base years and CEP schools should use the Family Income Survey, located on the <u>Community Eligibility</u> <u>Provision and Provision 2 webpage</u>.

PROCESSING APPLICATIONS

The <u>Eligibility Manual for School Meals</u> is the USDA guiding document for determining household eligibility for meals and disclosure of free and reduced-price eligibility information. The most current manual is dated July 2017.

LEAs must ensure the following application processing requirements are met:

- Eligibility determinations are made within 10 working days.
- The <u>2023–24 Income Guidelines</u> are used to determine eligibility.
- Assign a hearing official and determining official. This cannot be the same individual.
 - The *"determining official"* is the individual(s) responsible for reviewing and approving free and reduced-price meal applications.
 - The *"hearing official"* is the individual responsible for reviewing and making a determination regarding an appeal to a benefit determination.

Notification of Eligibility Determination

Local education agencies must notify households of their eligibility status. Households with children who are *approved* for free or reduced-price meal benefits may be notified either

verbally or in writing. Households with children who are *denied* benefits must be provided with written notification of the denial through mail or email.

Local education agencies may use the following prototype Notice of Eligibility letters available on the <u>Free and Reduced-Price Information webpage</u>:

- <u>Notice of Eligibility for Free or Reduced-Price Meals</u>: This letter may be used to notify households of students who have been approved for free or reduced-price meals.
- <u>Notice of Eligibility for Free Meals Directly Certified</u>: This letter may be used to notify households of students who have been approved for free meals through Direct Certification.
- <u>Notice of Eligibility for Free Meals or Reduced-Price Meals Direct Certification</u> <u>Medicaid</u>: This letter may be used to notify households of students who have been approved for free or reduced-price meals through Direct Certification – Medicaid.
- <u>Notice of Denied Eligibility for Free or Reduced-Price Meals</u>: This letter may be used to notify households of students who have been denied free or reduced-price meal benefits. Households with students who are denied must be given written notification of the denial.

LEAs may use their own notification/denial letters, but the letter must include:

- Reason for denial of benefits,
- Right to appeal,
- Instructions on how to appeal,
- Ability to reapply for benefits at any time during the year if their household circumstances change; and
- The USDA Non-Discrimination Statement.

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS AND INFORMATION

Translations and Limited English Proficiency (LEP)

The application materials and other communications with households concerning eligibility determinations must be made available in a language parents and guardians understand. The USDA provides <u>application translations in 49 languages</u>. OSPI also provides notification and letter templates in multiple languages.

LEAs have the responsibility to be aware of the language needs of LEP households in their district. LEAs must also include an assurance there will be no discrimination against LEP households in their media release. The OSPI CNS <u>Limited English Proficiency Reference Sheet</u> provides details on requirements.

Consent to Share Child Nutrition Program Eligibility Information for Other School Programs

USDA confidentiality rules protect student and household information collected for determining free and reduced-price meal eligibility. Disclosure of eligibility information to programs not outlined in the National School Lunch Act (NSLA) requires parent or guardian consent. These programs include local programs and activities, such as fees for band, athletics, field trips, or Associated Student Body (ASB).

Parent or guardian consent must be obtained annually and prior to disclosure – households must also be able to limit consent to only those programs with which they wish to share information. If a child is directly certified, the LEA must have a system in place to obtain consent from these households before sharing their information.

Local education agencies that gather parent or guardian consent for local programs that offer reduced fees for students eligible for meal benefits can use the <u>Consent to Share Child</u> <u>Nutrition Program Eligibility Information for Other School Programs form</u>. This form may be included with the letter to households sent home at the beginning of the school year or with the letter notifying households they have been directly certified or approved for meal benefits.

Media Release for Free and Reduced-Price Meals

The USDA requires LEAs to notify the public about the availability of school meal programs. OSPI provides an annual public release to the media that meets this regulation. However, LEAs are encouraged to provide a release and a supply of meal application forms to local organizations providing assistance to low-income families such as food banks; Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) clinics; post offices; and employment security offices.

Civil Rights Requirements

Local education agencies participating in USDA school meal programs are required to inform potentially eligible persons of their rights to receive program benefits. The USDA Civil Rights Nondiscrimination Statement (<u>updated May 2022</u>) must be placed on program materials widely disseminated to students and families. This includes, but is not limited to:

- Student handbooks containing program information
- School nutrition services webpages
- Letters to families
- Menus and brochures
- Online meal application

Washington state has additional protected classes that are not outlined in the USDA Civil Rights Nondiscrimination Statement. Public School Districts and Public Charter Schools must put both the USDA, and the schools' non-discrimination statement on widely disseminated program materials.

Assurance of Civil Rights Compliance

The Sponsor hereby agrees that it will comply with: i. Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. 2000d et seq.); ii. Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (20 U.S.C. 1681 et seq.); iii. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 794); iv. Age Discrimination Act of 1975 (42 U.S.C. 6101 et seq.); v. Title II and Title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990 as amended by the ADA Amendment Act of 2008 (42 U.S.C. 12131-12189); vi. Executive Order 13166, "Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency." (August 11, 2000); vii. All provisions required by the implementing regulations of the Department of Agriculture (USDA) (7 CFR Part 15 et seq.); viii. Department of Justice Enforcement Guidelines (28 CFR Parts 35, 42 and 50.3); ix. Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) directives and guidelines to the effect that, no person shall, on the grounds of race, color, national origin, sex, age, or disability, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or otherwise be subject to discrimination under any program or activity for which the Program applicant receives Federal financial assistance from USDA; and hereby gives assurance that it will immediately take measures necessary to effectuate this Agreement. x. By accepting this assurance, the Sponsor agrees to compile data, maintain records, and submit records and reports as required, to permit effective enforcement of nondiscrimination laws and permit authorized USDA personnel during hours of program operation to review and copy such records, books, and accounts, access such facilities and interview such personnel as needed to ascertain compliance with the nondiscrimination laws. If there are any violations of this assurance, the Department of Agriculture, FNS, shall have the right to seek judicial enforcement of this assurance. This assurance is binding on the Sponsor, its successors, transferees and assignees as long as it receives assistance or retains possession of any assistance from USDA.

OSPI provides equal access to all programs and services without discrimination based on sex, race, creed, religion, color, national origin, age, honorably discharged veteran or military status, sexual orientation, gender expression, gender identity, disability, or the use of a trained dog guide or service animal by a person with a disability.
