

# Open Doors: Fall 2020 Apportionment Guidance

Making academic progress for the months April through June is not required. The rules state that after a student has been claimed for 3 months on a P223 for state funding, they must show academic progress. For these months, enrollment was projected, and districts did not claim their students on an actual P223. The emergency rule for redefining the minimum attendance period requirement of what constitutes face to face time is in effect through September 5<sup>th</sup>, 2020 (OSPI intends to refile this emergency rule). Weekly status checks have not changed.

Open Doors programs **not operating in the summer** will need to look back to months prior to the COVID 19 school closure period to determine if a student is eligible to be claimed for September and October. Assuming that a student was claimed by the Open Doors program for the months of January, February and March, programs would need to go back to the first school day in January (the January count day) to determine if a student made academic progress to be eligible to be claimed on the September and October P223s. For the November P223, this student would need to have made academic progress since last claimed for February based on the first school day for that month (the February count day).

Open Doors programs that **operated during the summer** will need to look at those months (July and August) and back to the month of March to determine a student's eligibility for apportionment. Any indicator of academic progress earned during that time would satisfy the IAP requirement. The student must still meet the other eligibility requirements be claimed on the September P223.

Participation on or before the September count day is required for all students, and for continuing students, meeting the weekly status check and minimum attendance period requirement for August also apply.

## Post-COVID Continuous Enrollment Chart with NO Summer Programming

Continuing students and returning students who, after being claimed for state funding for three count days excluding the September count day, have not earned an indicator of academic progress cannot be claimed for state funding until an indicator of academic progress is earned.

Practice: Count back over the months to the 3rd previous apportionment claim to find an IAP. Row Three shows that for an October claim, the program must count back to January, then look for an IAP sometime between January 1 and September 30.

Reference: Rows One and Two shows the application of WAC [392-700-160\(2\)\(b\)](#).

Continuing students and returning students who, after being claimed for state funding for three count days excluding the September count day, have not earned an indicator of academic progress cannot be claimed for state funding until an indicator of academic progress is earned.

Practice: Count back over the months to the 3<sup>rd</sup> previous apportionment claim to find an IAP. Row Three shows that for an October claim, the program must count back to March, then look for an IAP sometime between March 1 and September 30.
